



If no visible lesions of tuberculosis are found at the *post mortem*, a selection of material from commonly affected lymph nodes will be sent for culture. If the culture is negative, only one further skin test 60 days after the reactor left, will usually be required. However, in some circumstances two further tests may be needed. If other livestock species are also kept with an infected goat herd, they will be subject to TB testing as well.

A faster, but less popular way to achieve freedom of movement restrictions after *M. bovis* has been confirmed is to voluntarily slaughter all the remaining goats (for which no statutory compensation would be paid). If this takes place, the restrictions can be lifted 60 days later providing that adequate cleansing and disinfection of the feed troughs and housing of the goats has taken place.

It is important that livestock owners of all species work together to try to eliminate this damaging and potentially dangerous disease. If your herd is required to carry out a TB test, please be assured that it is for the greater benefit of all, in the ongoing campaign to eradicate bovine tuberculosis.

A summary of the key recommendations to reduce the risk of TB in your goats is given below:

- Consider privately skin testing goats before selling or after arrival
- Arrange for a post mortem examination of any unexplained deaths in your herd; either by your private vet or at one of APHA's veterinary investigation centres
- Reduce movements where possible eg attendance at shows, travel to matings
- Avoid co-grazing with other species and contact with neighbouring livestock
- Try to keep your goats away from badgers by fencing off setts and latrines and keeping housing and feed stores secure. Feeding concentrates from regularly cleaned out troughs and not on the ground is also recommended. If you use mineral licks, these should be kept as inaccessible to badgers as possible.:

TB-infected goats between farms. Most cases in sheep are found when they are meat inspected at slaughter, but cases are probably under reported.

The tuberculin skin test can be used in goats and appears to work well. Even in herds vaccinated against Johne's disease, the specificity of the comparative skin test (using avian and bovine tuberculins), as reported in different studies in Europe, is very high, meaning that the probability of false positive results is very low. Statutory compensation payments are available for any goats slaughtered for TB control reasons, with new rates applicable since January 2018.

Sheep are believed to be "dead end hosts" whereas goats are classed as "spill-over hosts" of *M. bovis* with the potential to amplify and transmit the disease to other species.

As a result of these concerns, there is a requirement to restrict the movement and skin test goat herds, but not sheep flocks, if they are co-located or adjacent to a cattle herd sustaining a TB incident with lesioned or culture-positive animals. As there are over 300 new incidents of cattle TB each year in Cornwall, it is not unusual for adjacent or contiguous goat herds to be identified for skin testing. This is a precautionary measure and the vast majority will test clear. If goat owners refuse to allow skin testing in these circumstances, movement restrictions will be served on the herd. These will be lifted if the skin test is completed with negative results.

By contrast, if skin test positive animals ('reactors') are found at a test, movement restrictions will also be applied and the reactors will be valued and removed. A *post mortem* examination will then be carried out to look for lesions of tuberculosis in the organs and lymph nodes and to collect tissue samples for culture of the bacterium in the laboratory. Laboratory culture = normally takes 6-8 weeks, but can be up to 12 weeks as *M. bovis* is a very slow growing organism. If these cultures are positive for *M. bovis*, two further clear skin tests at 60 day intervals of the remaining goats (using a more severe interpretation of the test readouts) will be required before the movement restrictions can be lifted.

TB in Goats

Bovine tuberculosis is caused by the bacterium Mycobacterium bovis (M. bovis). Although it is often found in cattle, it can infect any mammal, including humans, and goats. It is primarily a disease of the respiratory system and can be spread via droplets in exhaled air. The bacterium can survive, but not multiply, in the farm environment for months in ideal conditions. Warm, sunny and dry weather speeds up the inactivation of the bacterium in soil, pasture, etc.

Most human TB cases in the UK are due to infection with Mycobacterium tuberculosis, a bacterium closely related to (but different from) M. bovis. However, historically, many were due to M. bovis prior to pasteurisation of milk, compulsory cattle skin testing, meat inspection, cattle movement and slaughter controls. . The disease in humans is difficult to cure and requires prolonged courses of three or more different antibiotics. Human cases seen nowadays in the UK are very rare, however, and most of them are due primarily either to recrudescence of latent TB infection acquired decades ago (i.e. before milk pasteurisation became widespread), or as a result of travel to or from other countries with high levels of disease.

In the UK, TB caused by M. bovis has been recorded in pigs, wild boar, goats, sheep, alpacas, llamas, dogs, cats, ferrets, farmed and wild deer, various zoo species and grey seals in addition to cattle, and of course badgers.

Of all the non-bovine species listed above, dogs, cats, ferrets, camelids and dairy sheep and goats are probably more significant with respect to human health due to their closer interaction with their owners, or their use for producing milk and other dairy products that can be consumed unpasteurised.

Signs of disease in pigs, wild boar, deer and sheep are usually found at meat inspection. Dogs, cats, ferrets and camelids are normally detected by veterinary investigation of sick individuals, in the case of cats, these are normally bite wound abscesses.

Cases of TB in sheep and goats caused by M. bovis infection are relatively uncommon. However, there have been a few serious outbreaks in dairy goat herds in the South West in the last ten years. In some cases, those outbreaks were linked to the movement of
